Road Renewal Projects

Huron County Public Works is working with our industry partners to continue road construction projects to the extent possible while protecting the health of all workers and their families. Many of the construction projects are completed by operators of heavy equipment which are operated by single operators, truck drivers, and by roadside workers having normally more than the 2m physical distancing expectations during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additional disinfection protocols for shared equipment, tools, and facilities will be discussed with our Contractors to ensure they are meeting expectations set out by our Health Professionals. At this time, it is anticipated that the following project will proceed:

• Partial reconstruction of County Road 87 from County Road 86 to County Road 28.

Road Reconstruction Projects

Major road reconstruction for County Road 12 from Egmondville through Seaforth will be impacted by COVID-19. A number of the tasks in this project require staff to work closely together in confined spaces as well as work within the buildings of many of the businesses. These activities cannot proceed and maintain safe physical distancing protocols.

The project team is working with our Consulting Engineers and Contractors to work through what parts of the project can proceed now, and what work will need to be delayed. Additional information will be provided to businesses and residents in this project area on a regular basis.

Road Maintenance and Inspections

Huron County Public Works staff are continuing to maintain roads and bridges an essential service. We respect the need to protect the health of our staff and their families and are altering all protocols and procedures to provide physical distancing and disinfection protocols at our facilities, our equipment, and tools.

You will continue to see our staff out on the County roads maintaining roads, bridges, and culverts in a variety of ways. While cutting the grass, grading the shoulders, cutting trees, inspecting

culverts, sweeping sand off the roadways, or even picking up roadside garbage may not seem like essential service tasks, they are activities that are needed to keep primary transportation routes safe and clean. It also ensures that we maintain sufficient active staffing levels to respond to more obvious needs such as slippery roads, drainage issues, potholes, and other hazards that occur on the roadways on a regular basis.

You will also continue to see other County staff, contractors, and consultants working within our right-of-way taking pavement samples, taking measurements, and a variety of other activities that address immediate issues or being done to prepare for future projects which require one or more years of planning, design, permits, and coordination before the work can take place.

Protocols for each activity are reviewed and altered to ensure that staff maintain physical distancing practices and following advice of Health Care professionals for disinfection of equipment, tools, and workplace on a regular basis.

Huron County Public Works FAQ

How do I submit a bid for a published tender or proposal?

Public Works publishes tenders and requests for proposals using Biddingo (www.biddingo.com) and has been doing so for a number of years. As a result of COVID-19, we are now accepting digital submission of tenders and bids through Biddingo so delivery to our office is no longer needed.

A few tenders that are only locally feasible (i.e. supply of gravel and sand) are published in the local newspapers. In these, cases, the County will publish how to send tender packages through to the County.

How do I contact Public Works for a concern I have with a County Road?

Contacting Public Works remain unchanged as staff are monitoring phone calls and emails and we continue to have after-hours and emergency contacts available.

How do I submit a request for a change to a driveway entrance or a new entrance to a County Road?

There is no change to this process other than it may take a little longer to coordinate the onsite meeting and receive approvals. Please contact Public Works via publicworks@huroncounty.ca with details and your contact information and we will direct you to the area Road Supervisor to review your application.

Do I still need to obtain an Oversize/ Overweight trip permit at this time?

Annual permits as well as one-time permits are still required to transport an oversize/overweight load on County Roads as per the Highway Traffic Act.
